Dr Bailey is a registered and chartered forensic psychologist, and has worked for The Lucy Faithfull Foundation since 2005. Alongside her work with The Lucy Faithfull Foundation, she has a background in working with men and women within secure forensic mental health services, and previously worked with the UK Ministry of Justice as part of the Female Sex Offender Project team. Dr Bailey is also currently a lecturer at Goldsmiths, University of London.

At The Lucy Faithfull Foundation, Dr Bailey undertakes specialist risk assessments and interventions commissioned by a range of agencies, and provides training, advice and consultancy to other professionals. Dr Bailey leads the work at The Lucy Faithfull Foundation on women who sexually offend.

Dr Bailey also provides clinical support to the Stop It Now! helpline, an anonymous and confidential helpline for all adults with concerns about child sexual abuse, including those concerned about either their own or another person's sexual thoughts, feelings and/or behaviour towards children, as well adults concerned about the sexual behaviour of a child or young person.

Dr Bailey is involved in the development and promotion of The Lucy Faithfull Foundation's deterrence campaign regarding the viewing of indecent images of children and the online grooming of children, and was involved in the design and implementation of The Lucy Faithfull Foundation's online self-help website 'Get Help' for individuals concerned about their online sexual behaviour regarding children.
